# EHNA GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

*from January 23, 2024*

The EHNA General Meeting in January 2024 started at 6:54 PM with around 30 attendees.

**Vice President Barbara Boyett** greeted everyone and called for approval of the minutes and the treasurer's report, both of which received a motion and a second.

**NPO Roger Cannon** provided an update on safety and crime, indicating minimal activity in Eastern Hills, except for an incident involving high school students at Spanish Village Apartments. Measures, including staffing key areas near the school with Resource Officers and Officer Cannon, have led to a decrease in incidents. There was a property crime on Chimney Rock. Officer Cannon responded to shots and fireworks on New Year's Eve, confiscating fireworks at Panther Mart. The Texaco has been quiet, with surveillance in place. Nuisance abatement has prompted business clean-up efforts. A neighbor reported difficulties in alerting authorities about a homeless person causing a disturbance, highlighting the need for a streamlined reporting process. Officer Cannon recommended contacting him directly during weekdays or 911 otherwise. He also mentioned ongoing efforts to ensure business compliance in Eastern Hills through collaboration between Code Compliance and FWPD.

Barbara Boyett advised that she is running the general meeting because President Julie West is at the City Council meeting regarding the transportation proposal for East Lancaster. Barbara introduced James Carter, the Election

Nominations Chair and he could introduced the 2024 Slate of Officers:

- **President:** Tonya Ferguson
- **Vice President:** Cynthia Brink Fenney
- **Secretary:** Crystal Thomas
- **Treasurer:** Barbara Ragsdale
- **Parliamentarian:** Kristina Lund and Barbara Boyett

All nominees said a little bit about themselves and how long they have lived in Eastern Hills. Barbara Boyett removed herself from seeking the position of Parliamentarian. There were no other nominations, so there was a motion made and accepted to accept the slate of officers as presented. The votes were unanimous to accept the slate of officers.

Barbara Boyett passed the meeting to **Tonya Ferguson**, who encouraged attendees to complete the EHNA survey for feedback and direction. She highlighted the Block Captains program, with Volker Timm elaborating on its role in community engagement and the need for volunteers.

Tonya also promoted Timeless Care's Coffee Chat on Saturdays from 9:30-11:30 for neighborhood gatherings.

**Marissa Davis** reminded everyone about using the My FW app for reporting city issues, noting its efficiency.

**Nichelle Lang** announced the January Wine Night for January 25, mentioning available hosting slots in August and September.

Tonya concluded by thanking participants and board members, ending the meeting at 7:27 PM.

## Reason Number One:

### *First Class Museums*

#### AMON CARTER MUSEUM OF AMERICAN ART

Visitors to the museum are beneficiaries of one man's art collection, Amon Carter. Amon Carter bought newspaper companies, think The Fort Worth Star Telegram, and then moved on to radio and television stations, think WBAP. Amon Carter was responsible for bringing the first television station to Texas. However, he made most of his money in oil. During the mid-1930s, Amon Carter began purchasing art principally from two artists, Charles Russell and Fredrick Remington. Before his death, he set up a trust for residents of Fort Worth to enjoy his art for free. Amon Carter Museum opened its doors in 1961 with a collection of paintings, watercolors and bronzes. The museum houses a fine collection of American Art, with rotating exhibits and scheduled activities to heighten a visitor's experience. The museum is open daily, except for Monday and holidays. Every Thursday, the museum is open until 8pm. If you want to visit the museum when it is closed, explore the collection online!

Dive deeper into the Amon Carter Museum by participating in the free programs the museum offers. This is a short list.

#### SID RICHARDSON MUSEUM

Sid Richardson also made his money in oil. Amon Carter influenced Sid Richardson to establish a foundation that would benefit the city through art. The foundation is governed by its President, Pete Geren, and Sid Richardson's family, the Besses as board members. The foundation, which governs the museum (and other philanthropic interests), focuses on art and education. Sid Richardson Museum is small compared to others in the city however, it boasts an amazing collection of western art. The museum is open every day, except holidays. Admission is free.

Dive deeper into the Museum by participating in free programs the museum offers. This is a short list.

## KIMBELL ART MUSEUM

The Kimbell's owned and operated grocery stores in Texas. Kay and Velma Kimbell did not have children. They are benefactors whose money and collections are gifted to the citizens of Fort Worth via the Kimbell Art Museum. Kay and Velma collected French and British Portraits from the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries. During the 1960s, the Kimbell Foundation policies included expanding the collection by purchasing "world history in art" as well as "acquiring objects with remarkable aesthetic quality". The Kimbell Permanent Collection is always free and is open every day of the week except Monday and holidays. Special exhibitions require a paid ticket. Half-Price Admission is offered on Tuesdays from 10am-5pm and Fridays 5pm-8pm.

For a unique twist, visit during Happy Hour, Fridays, 5pm-7pm; Ongoing unless there is a private event.

## MODERN ART MUSEUM

The Modern has not always been the Modern. The first iteration of the museum was founded by twenty five women in 1892 as a Library and Art Club. These women wanted a different kind of gallery; One that was not centered on cattle ranching. Perhaps you have heard of The Carnegie Public Library Art Gallery, 1901, or the Fort Worth Art Museum, 1974. These are early renditions of the The Modern Art Museum; It has evolved over the last one hundred years into its current form and location. The museum is currently famous for a collection of modern and contemporary art dating from the 1940s to the present. The museum is open everyday except Monday and holidays. There is an admission fee for the art exhibits. Although the architecture of the building and its contents are striking, I find inspiration from the films shown at Magnolia at the Modern.

**Movies that Matter** - A free event hosted by the city and "housed" in Magnolia at the Modern. These movies challenge us to face our prejudices, ask us how we can better serve our communities, or simply allow us to laugh at the human condition. Registration is required.

# PETS. FENCE them, LEASH them, LICENSE & VACCINATE them. IT'S THE LAW.

Owning a pet responsibly goes beyond just providing the basics like food, water, and shelter. It includes important practices such as vaccinating your pet, keeping them on a leash, and securing them within a fenced area to address broader community health and safety concerns. Your participation is crucial.

## **Pet Licensing:**

In the city, all dogs, cats, and ferrets must be licensed and wear their license tag on their collar or harness at all times. License fees range from \$12 to \$36 and can be obtained from the Chuck Silcox Animal Shelter located at 4900 Martin Street. Failure to comply can result in fines up to \$2,000.

## **Pet Restraint:**

Dogs must be kept securely within the owner's property by a physical barrier or when outside the property, must be on a leash and under the owner's control at all times. Non-compliance with these rules can lead to fines up to \$2,000 for having unrestrained or at-large pets.

## **Vaccination:**

Pets, including dogs, cats, and ferrets, must be vaccinated against rabies by four months of age, with a booster at 12 months and subsequent vaccinations every three years thereafter. For those seeking financial assistance, free or low-cost services are offered through partners like

**SOMETIMES A BARK CAN  
FEEL WORSE THAN A BITE**

Remember, while bite marks may heal, incessant barking is a persistent issue. However, there are constructive approaches to address excessive barking.

Firstly, avoid blaming the dog or the pet owner immediately, as they may be unaware of the nuisance. A polite conversation with your neighbor about their dog's barking when they're away is a good starting point. If the issue persists and the owner seems indifferent, there are legal avenues you can explore.

For pet owners with a dog that barks excessively, consider that your neighbors are likely seeking quiet rather than conflict. Although your dog's barking might make you feel safe, it can be distressing for others. Engaging a professional dog trainer can be an effective solution to reduce your dog's barking.

## What is Code Blue?

Code Blue, initiated in 1991, represents a collaborative initiative involving the City of Fort Worth, the Fort Worth Police Department, and residents committed to combating crime in our community. The cornerstone of Code: Blue is the Citizens on Patrol (COP) neighborhood program. Through this program, volunteers serve as additional eyes and ears for the Fort Worth Police Department, collaborating closely with Neighborhood Police Officers to either prevent crime or assist in solving it. Volunteers dedicate their time to patrol their community, observing and reporting any suspicious or criminal activities to the authorities. The primary aim is to diminish crime rates through effective collaboration with the police force.

## How does COPS Benefit Our Neighborhood?

The presence of COPS in Eastern Hills leads to enhanced security for homes and properties, stricter code enforcement, and greater community engagement, all of which contribute to deterring criminal activities. The visible presence of police authority through patrols helps to lower crime rates. Moreover, COPS fosters a strong bond between the police force and the community, ensuring quicker police responses. This collective effort significantly enhances the safety and security of Eastern Hills, making it a more desirable place to reside.

## Does COPS Reduce Crime?

Absolutely! In Eastern Hills, the COP program has observed a noticeable decrease in crime rates since its establishment. The more frequent and active the patrols, the more significant the reduction in crime statistics.

The aim for Eastern Hills COPS is to conduct patrols every day of the week, but this requires the support of volunteers. The greater the number of volunteers, the less time each individual needs to commit to achieve continuous patrol coverage.

## How Much Time Do I Need to Commit to COPS?

Your commitment is flexible! Beyond the initial 8-hour training session and mandatory ride-alongs, you decide how much time you can dedicate to patrolling the neighborhood. If you're willing to devote some of your time each month, we'll ensure it's put to good use. Patrols are conducted in personal vehicles, which bear COPS identification via magnetic signs, to survey the neighborhood.
